Dear Volunteers -

Our world looks vastly different since our last newsletter and so does Helpline House. The number of clients we are serving remains steady AND we have added 61 new clients since the beginning of April. You might be interested in knowing that we just finished week #18 of our curbside delivery. Our current plan is to continue with this model through the end of September. In order to provide curbside food delivery, the inside of Helpline House had to be entirely reconfigured. I wish we could give

volunteer tours because I think you would be impressed with the new arrangement and with the level of efficiency that has been reached. Many clients have indicated that they like this curbside model very much. Our temporary employees - **Dan Bacon**,

Cami Holtmeier and Laurie Reese are masters at taking orders, thoughtfully preparing those orders and getting cars loaded. The average time for completing the process is about 5 minutes per car. We continue to get creative with distribution of items that are not part of our prepackaged bags. The 'MYSTERY BAG OF DRINKS" is a very popular choice. Week 19 will include Mexican and Indian food EXTRAS being offered.

Are you wondering what a prepacked bag of food contains?



1 can of soup, 1 can beans or veggies, 1 can of protein – tuna or chicken, 1 can of fruit, EXTRAS (depending on the week), bread, fresh fruit, fresh produce, choice of meat, choice of eggs or butter. We also have a vegetarian option.




WELCOME BACK – Angie Emerson has been enjoying a well-deserved break for the month of July. We will all be excited to have her back 8/3.
